'How To' - a step by step guide

WE WOULD LIKE YOU TO REPRODUCE THE TEXTURE OF A SURFACE BY TAKING A DIRECT RUBBING USING GRAPHITE

You will need:

- White paper
- · Graphite stick
- Records form
- Returns envelope



By combining your artwork, gathered from across the county, we aim to create a tonal picture from the surfaces of Nottinghamshire. We'd like to know more about the objects you've chosen, to help us discover links to the county's heritage. Tell us about where they were found and what was/is their purpose. Your rubbings will be photographed and uploaded to the Inspire Picture Archive and join over 5 million documents in Nottinghamshire Archives!

How To Frottage





A STEP BY STEP GUIDE

Step 1: Place a piece of paper over the textured surface.

Step 2: Rub the paper with the graphite stick to deposit marks, continue until the image is revealed on the surface of the paper.

Step 3: That's it, you've successfully recorded a surface! All you need to do now is complete the records form, to let us know the location of your surface.

Step 4: Please return your artwork and the completed records form to an Inspire Library as soon as you have finished but no later than **Tues 25 May**. Visit: inspireculture.org.uk for library opening information.

Top Tips:

- Street signs, benches and litter bins surfaces with patterns, letters or numbers are great fun to capture
- Metalwork drain covers, old door hinges and brass plates can be very decorative
- Post boxes how many Royal Cyphers can you spot?
- Stonework look for foundation stones or the marks of the mason
- Locally made bricks and ceramic tiles might tell a tale
- We've found that a low relief works best, where the design stands out from the surface and is slightly accentuated
- Remember to work safely and respect the surface you are capturing

Just like you, professional artist Chris Lewis-Jones has also been busy collecting heritage surfaces across Nottinghamshire and a tonal picture of the county will be on display in the Surfaces of the Shire Exhibition.
