
## Your reading newsletter from Inspire



### **Bailey's Women's Prize for Fiction**

Naomi Alderman's *The Power* took the 2017 prize earlier this month.

Set in the very near future, girls find that with a flick of their fingers they can inflict agonizing pain and even death. With this single twist, the four lives at the heart of Naomi Alderman's extraordinary, visceral will aim to create 'a myriad of words' - lines which will 'work' as a poem regardless of the order in which they are read.
