This year we are excited to welcome the acclaimed poet Imtiaz Dharker who will be sharing her 'desert island poems' in conversation with the Library Director of Bromley House Library Clare Brown, before reading from her own work. The brilliant Romalyn Ante returns to the festival for a workshop and performance, while Bad Betty Press joins us for an afternoon of poetry featuring Jake Wild Hall, Chris Lanyon and Leanne Moden. Library-based poetry collective Paper Crane invites us to their showcase, while Five Leaves New Poetry celebrates two years of publishing regional poets with the launch of two new pamphlets. Plus, the Social Model Writers make their festival debut with a sharing session, and don't miss the chance to have a poem scribed for you at our Poems While You Wait event.

We also have workshops from Andrew Graves, James Trevelyan and Writing East Midlands' groundbreaking Beyond the Spectrum project. Children from invited schools in Mansfield are set to enjoy an extremely funny poetry performance from Paul Cookson, and there's also a film about Keats, a children's short film and poetry activity, and an exhibition featuring photography, poetry and prose.

Nuclear Bunker: A Creative Archive

On a patch of suburban wasteland in Nottingham, a Cold War relic lies abandoned. This is Regional Seat of Government 3, a nuclear bunker from which a commissioner and a staff of 400 people would have governed whatever remained of the North Midlands after nuclear war.

This exhibition sees the bunker through the eyes of writers and experts who ventured through the bunker's steel doors to explore it in the summer of 2024.

Featuring poetry, fiction, artwork and photography, it wanders the windowless corridors, offices, dormitories and washrooms of a place from a terrible alternate reality.

The exhibition features poetry and prose by acclaimed writers: Zayneb Allak, Hannah Cooper-Smithson, Daniel Cordle, Anthony Cropper, Ailbhe Darcy, Jay Gao, Delphine Grass, Jonathan Hogg, Helena Hunter, Sarah Jackson, Phil Leonard, Jon McGregor, Andrew Taylor, and Maria Gil Ulldemolins. The book to accompany the exhibition *Bunker: Stories and Poems from a*Nuclear Age is edited by Daniel Cordle and Sarah Jackson, and is published by Five Leaves Publications.

Her seven collections include *Over the Moon* and the latest *Shadow Reader*, with poems featured on radio, television, the London Underground and Mumbai buses. She has had eleven solo exhibitions of drawings and scripts and directs video films, many of them for non-

government organisations working in the area of shelter, education and health for women and children in India.

Romalyn Ante FRSL is an award-winning Filipino-British poet, author, and editor. Romalyn was born and bred in Lipa, Philippines and migrated to the UK when she was sixteen. Her debut collection, *Antiemetic for Homesickness* (Chatto, 2020), was shortlisted for the Jhalak Prize and longlisted for the Dylan Thomas Prize. Her second collection, *AGIMAT* (Chatto, 2024), was awarded the Arthur Welton Award, and was a Poetry Book Society Recommendation and The Observer Poetry Book of the Month. She was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature in 2023. The Fellowship is a lifetime honour that includes 'the best writers in or from the UK today'. She currently sits on the editorial board for Poetry London.
