We turned art into science around the county with The Big Draw! 1,500 participants learned about electronic circuits making light up drawings with conductive pens and LED lights. The wonderful artwork toured library galleries and was seen by 72,785 library visitors.

Inspire successfully achieved Matrix and Customer Service Excellence Standards, both government standards which accredit the quality of our customer service and information provision right across Inspire services. Four of our larger libraries were awarded the Family Arts Standard. This means we are working really hard to make families feel welcome

We marked Inspire's 2016-17 partnership with National Youth Choirs of Great Britain (NYCGB),

kicking off in December with An Inspired Christmas Concert at Nottingham's Royal Concert Hall, showcasing the fruits of vocal development with partner school choirs.

The work continued with NYCGB choral directors and Inspire's own vocal teachers to develop **five a capella choirs** with Nottinghamshire secondary schools, culminating in a magnificent Live at Lunch performance at the Royal Concert Hall in May.











In February 2017 we welcomed 126 delegates from 38 schools to our **inaugural Nottinghamshire**Music Education Conference at the Royal

Concert Hall. The day provided a showcase for our wider Music Hub offer to schools, and included sessions for teachers, live demonstrations of our extensive pupil enrichment and curriculum support programme plus a 36 exhibitor strong music educators Market Place



Inspire Youth Arts formerly County Youth Arts celebrated their Ten20 anniversary – the service was first launched 20 years ago, and in the last 10 years they have developed the youth arts venue in Mansfield, The Old Library. They have worked with over 30,000 young people over the years across music, dance, drama, film and media with young people being at the heart of their work.



Using the arts we created, **Library Landscape - A Myriorama for Nottinghamshire**. Made by library users and special schools with Leicester Print workshop artist Sue Rowland with funding from Children in Need. Sets of cards are available in every Nottinghamshire Library for all to enjoy.

Myriorama or many thousand views is a picture made up of a number of different parts that can be rearranged to make lots of different scenes.



Our programme of **Dementia Friendly Film** screenings was launched in partnership with Film Hub Central East, BFI Film, Audience Network and Broadway Cinema. To date, we have screened 9 classic films from Summer Holiday to Casablanca to over 400 people living with dementia and their carer's

The Inspire Picture Archive was launched housing thousands of images of historical Nottinghamshire. Images can be browsed, downloaded, catalogued and shared. The collection features wonderful photographs from the Raleigh Cycle Company. Our Archives team also contributed to Pedalling Dreams: The Raleigh Story watched by over 400,000 people on the BBC.



Worksop library opened its doors as a Fun Palace in May with over 2,000 people coming to discover, create and perform. Our library visitors found their inner artist and scientist in a range of activities from computer coding to candy floss making!



Inspire was chosen to join Arts Council England's National Portfolio from April 2018. National Portfolio Organisations are those who receive regular funding from the Arts Council, and Inspire will receive £1m for a four year period from 2018.

Inspire also received funding through Arts Council England's Grants for the Arts Libraries

Fund to develop an exciting and innovative musical project for children aged 3 – 5 and their families. In collaboration with MishMash Productions the project has created a brand new musical performance based on the popular children's picture book *Augustus and His Smile*.



We held our inaugural Inspire Awards,

celebrating the best of learning, creativity, innovation, service and excellence from 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017. Winners were recognised at an awards evening at Worksop library in June.





The Able Orchestra performed at the BBC Proms and BBC Music Day. The inclusive ensemble features a diverse group of young disabled and able bodied musicians from Nottinghamshire. Pupils from Fountaindale and Outwood Portland performed to 6,000 people at the Royal Albert Hall. A new piece was composed especially for BBC Music Day 2017.



Inspire secured funding from the National Lottery through Arts Council England to expand the original Southwell Poetry Festival to three further libraries across the county in July. Mansfield Central, West Bridgford and Worksop libraries joined Southwell in welcoming acclaimed poets from all over the UK for a week of readings, workshops and family activities

Highlights included sell-out performances by Jackie Kay and Hollie McNish and inspiring readings by local favourites Henry Normal and Mahendra Solanki.



We invited the people of Nottinghamshire to get healthy, sporty and be safe this year in our successful series of community events.

From our Let's Gets Healthy event to our touring Summer Safety roadshows we had record attendance of over 3,000 people.



We continue to wow audiences in our Jazz in Libraries programme in partnership with JazzSteps. The spring/summer season 2017 saw 15 gigs, which attracted a record 1,186 adults to Worksop, Southwell & West Bridgford Libraries.

Our Education Library Service has **inspired the planning of many Nottinghamshire teachers** by hosting several **Inset planning sessions** this year. Groups have varied in number from whole school staff to smaller key stage groups.

Library refurbishments in Beeston and Keyworth have delivered great new venues for reading, learning, culture and community activity creating modern, inviting spaces. Beeston library has become one of our flagship libraries with an extensive arts, learning and cultural programme.

Keyworth library reopened in May following extensive redecoration and building improvements. Beeston library reopened its doors in August following major refurbishment.

We launched our first ever full **Inspire Learning Short Course Guide** featuring hundreds of courses in venues across Nottinghamshire including our very own Inspire Libraries.

The guide aims to build on the success of our first year of Community Learning delivered as Inspire which saw 2,091 people learn with us. The new prospectus also features Study Programmes, Traineeships, Apprenticeships and in-house professional training.

Our Finances

The majority of funding for Inspire services comes from public funding. Nottinghamshire County Council is the main funder for Libraries, Archives and Cultural services. The Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) and the Arts Council England also fund specific areas of delivery.


During 2016/2017, an additional £0.5M of cultural and learning funding has been secured to deliver specific projects in Nottinghamshire. Inspire has also received its first legacy for delivery of improved services for people with visual impairment using Worksop library.

Expenditure and Funding

During 2016/2017 expenditure amounted to £18.3M with the Society achieving a small surplus.

For 2017/2018 the contract sum from the County Council amounts to £9.5M (£200K less). The total turnover of Inspire is estimated to be £18.4M.

Investment - one off

The County Council continues to modernise the library service and will spend £1.7M until 2018, refurbishing Mansfield Woodhouse, Ravenshead, Edwinstowe, Ruddington, Ollerton and Retford Libraries. In addition, the Council is investing £223K in the enhancement of learning and skills services provided by Inspire.

Governance

Inspire – Culture, Learning and Libraries (Midlands) is a community benefit society with charitable status. Inspire is registered with the Financial Conduct Authority (registered number 7139).

The main board is made up of 12 directors, four Community Directors (elected by our members) two County Council nominated, four co-opted, one Staff Director (elected by staff members) and the Chief Executive Officer. During 2016 the board established sub-committees in the following areas -

- Audit and Finance
- Development
- Learning and Skills
- Music, Heritage and Culture
- Staffing and Standards.

Case Study - Code Clubs

We are proud to host Code Clubs in our libraries, guiding children through fun challenges that introduce them to the basics of computer coding.

Jack has attended Mansfield Central Library Code Club for 3 terms now.

"I learn how to code computers using different software such as Scratch, Java Script, Python. We also use microbits and do loads of different projects. I really enjoy JavaScript coding, it's my favourite bit. I like to do it with friends at the club who can help with de-bugging any code that is wrong. We learn how to make it right by working together."

"Jack has improved his overall computer skills in general, and he now helps other children with computers at school too! His teacher pulled him in to help younger children in his school with computing, so his confidence is growing too."
