Welcome to our Inspire Review 2017-18.

Over the past year we have been working hard to establish ourselves as an effective and creative organisation that can deliver positive outcomes through our services. We aim to deliver our vision to **inspire people across Nottinghamshire to read, learn and enjoy culture.**

This review gives you an insight into the work we do, and highlights some of our innovative projects and services. We also continue to deliver reliable and customer centred services that are available day in, day out across our 66 buildings and 4 mobile vehicles.

Our customer satisfaction ratings are consistently high, we know this through surveys, customer compliments and external inspection. We recently regained accreditation to the Customer Service Excellence standard, with 2 highlighted areas of 'compliance plus'. In addition, we were pleased to be awarded the Family Arts Campaign 'Fantastic for Families - Best Family Welcome Award'. Our Learning services continue to offer accessible opportunities for learners across Nottinghamshire and in October the service was inspected by Ofsted and achieved GOOD.

Our staff are key to our success. Being friendly, professional and consistent in our customer service is a core part of who we are. This review would be quite a boring read without all their creativity, commitment and hard work.

Again, this year we need to thank our partners, volunteers, customers, learners, alongside our board members, Nottinghamshire County Council and our other funders for their contribution and engagement with Inspire. Inspiring self-confidence and employability

Dominique suffered from low self-esteem and lacked confidence, but she joined our Paediatric First Aid Course to develop her skills and knowledge. Dominique's learning journey is a great example of how Inspire Learning can build confidence, help people progress and enhance employability.

Josh also came to Inspire Learning with little self-confidence but went on to gain a certificate in English and Maths as part of our provision for 16-19 year olds. By September 2017, Josh had started a traineeship programme and went on to be offered a part-time role at the end of his placement.

Impacting loneliness and isolation

"Without volunteering at the library, I wouldn't have anything to do. I look forward to it, as I know I will see people and help them choose books." Library volunteer

Inspire works with local groups and volunteers to deliver services in some of our smaller communities. We trained 87 volunteers to oversee the daily running of some of our smallest libraries, with 62 of these (71%) stating their main reason for volunteering was because they were lonely or isolated.

Developing visual literacy and arts engagement

As part of the very successful Summer Reading Challenge 2017, professional artists and storytellers engaged with schools, young people and families with visual literacy through a series of mask making workshops and storytelling sessions to create visual artworks and imaginative stories. Students achieved Arts Award, teachers were trained to use storytelling and new visual art techniques, and young people's work was displayed in library galleries.

Developing confidence and potential

Margarita joined the Inspire Youth Arts singer songwriter academy, starting her on an incredible journey. She has progressed from playing alone in her bedroom unable to perform in front of anyone, to performing her own songs in front of 500 people at the Palace Theatre in Mansfield. Still only 15, she has grabbed every opportunity which has included recording sessions, being part of an inclusive ensemble re-imagining Beatles songs and busking in a museum!

Since 2016 Inspire Music's Nottinghamshire Music Hub partnership

with the National Youth Choirs of Great Britain (NYCGB) and the Royal Concert Hall Nottingham has created a programme to support the development of Nottinghamshire school choirs. It provides in-school vocal development workshops with industry professionals and exciting performance platforms such as performing on the Royal Concert Hall main stage at the Inspire Christmas Concert.

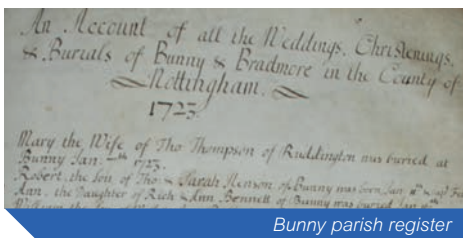

Our Finances

The majority of funding for Inspire services comes from public funding. Nottinghamshire County Council is the main funder for Libraries, Archives and Cultural services. The Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) and the Arts Council England (ACE) also fund specific areas of delivery.

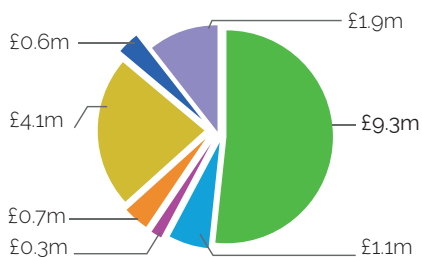
During 2017/2018, an additional £0.5M of cultural and learning funding has been secured to deliver specific projects in Nottinghamshire.

Expenditure and Funding

During 2017/2018 expenditure amounted to £19.1M with the Society achieving a small surplus.

For 2018/2019 the contract sum from the County Council amounts to £9.3M (£143K less). The total turnover of Inspire is estimated to be £18.6M.

Funding and income comes from:



- Nottinghamshire County Council
- Arts Council England - Music Hub
- Arts Council England NPO
- Services for Schools
- Education and Skills Funding Agency
- Libraries and Archives - Income
- Grants Donations and Other Income

Investment - one off

The County Council continues to modernise the library service and will spend £1M until 2019 updating ICT and refurbishing Edwinstowe, Retford and Ollerton Libraries.

Accreditation

Inspire continues to achieve recognition and accreditation from a number of external bodies covering many of our services;



Governance

Inspire – Culture, Learning and Libraries (Midlands) is a community benefit society with charitable status. Inspire is registered with the Financial Conduct Authority (registered number 7139).

The main board is made up of 12 directors, four Community Directors (elected by our members) two County Council nominated, four co-opted, one Staff Director (elected by staff members) and the Chief Executive Officer. There are sub-committees in the following areas -

- Audit and Finance
- Development
- Learning and Skills
- Music, Heritage and Culture
- Staffing and Standards.

Over **9,732** children were inspired to keep reading during the summer holidays with over 50,000 Library visitors having the chance to see artwork created in Summer Reading Challenge workshops.



Inspire Youth Arts created **112** music ensembles – creating enough music to compile a Spotify playlist lasting 24 hours!

Library knitters, knitted over **6,000** squares for charity during Craft Bomb 2017 – almost enough to cover a square mile!

Over **500** people attended Dementia Friendly Film screenings.
